Wrong?

If you have a dog, you probably know chocolate can be dangerous to your pooch. But you may not know that if your dog sticks his nose in your handbag and eats a pack of sugarless chewing gum, the consequences could be dead-ly

Sugarless gum may contain xylitol, a class of sweetener known as sugar alcohol.

Xylitol is present in many products and foods for human use but can be deadly to your pet.

Symptoms of xylitol poisoning in dogs include vomiting, followed by symptoms associated with the sudden lowering of your dog's blood sugar, such as decreased activity, weakness, staggering, incoordination, collapse and seizures.

If you think your dog has eaten xylitol, take him to your vet or an emergency animal hospital immediately.

Other products that may contain xylitol include:

- breath mints;
- baked goods;
- cough syrup;
- children's and adult chewable vitamins;
- mouthwash;
- toothpaste;
- some peanut and nut butters;
- over-the-counter medicines;
- · dietary supplements; and
- sugar-free desserts, including "skinny" ice cream;

Xylitol can be used in baked goods, too, such as cakes, muffins, and pies — often because the baker is substituting another sweetener for sugar, as in products for people with diabetes.

Call 811 So You Don't Need 911

Planning a home improvement job? Planting a tree? Installing a fence or deck? **WAIT!** Here's what you need to know first:

Whether you are planning to do it yourself or hire a professional, smart digging means calling 811 before each job.

Homeowners often make risky

assumptions about whether or not they should get their utility lines marked, but every digging job requires a call – **even small projects** like planting trees and shrubs.

The **depth** of utility lines **varies** and there may be multiple utility lines in a common area.

Digging without calling can disrupt service to an entire neighborhood, harm you and those around you and potentially result in fines and repair costs.

Calling 811 before every digging job gets your underground utility lines marked for free and helps prevent undesired consequences.

Do You Have A Gas Stove?

Recently a dog was seen on home video on his hind legs searching for food on the gas stovetop.

hit the burner knobs on gas stovetops.

If the burner isn't lit, this can cause propane gas to escape and build up in the home, resulting in a possible explosion.

If you have pets in your home and a gas stovetop, make sure you install protective covers to avoid a potentially fatal fire or explosion.

Magnets Can Be A Menace



Magnets found in many toys are strong enough to attract one another or other metal objects through body parts creating unique dangers particularly if swallowed.

If two or more ingested magnets, or one magnet and a magnetic piece such as a steel ball, attract in the intestines, they can pinch the intestinal walls cutting off the blood supply resulting in a dangerous

perforation.

Twisting of the intestine and blockages can also result from swallowed magnets.

Be extremely careful in purchasing toys containing magnets and vigilant in watching children while playing.

Keep any small magnets away from children younger than 6 years old because young children have a tendency to put objects in their mouths.

Children should never use magnets to emulate tongue, lip or nose piercings.

Children have also been known to use their teeth to pry apart two magnets.

Survey the child's play area, and if a magnet has become dislodged or if there is a magnet missing, stop using the toy immediately.

Vehicle Theft Prevention

This July, the U.S. Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) is continuing its annual Vehicle Theft Prevention Campaign during National Vehicle Prevention Month. In 2020 alone, more than 800,000 motor vehicles were stolen in the United States, costing vehicle owners more than \$7 billion. Review these 2020 statistics on vehicle theft in the United States and NHTSA's tips on keeping your

vehicle safe:

- Passenger cars made up more than 74% of all stolen motor vehicles.
- Only 56.4% of all stolen motor vehicles were recovered.
- There were 804,400 motor vehicles stolen. This is an 11.8% increase from 2019.
- A motor vehicle was stolen every 39 seconds.

Here are ways you can help **prevent motor vehicle theft**:

- Park in well-lit areas.
- Close and lock all windows and doors when you park.
- Hide valuables out of sight, such as in the glove box or trunk.
- Do not leave your keys in your vehicle.
- Do not leave the area while your vehicle is running.

Here are some of the safety issues from last month's "What's Wrong With This Picture?"


Some other problems many of you found included:
